Guidance for producing a poster for the British Association for Surgery of the Knee.

Content

- 1. Keep the content simple and uncluttered
- 2. A banner displaying the title, authors, institution and email address should be positioned at the top.
- 3. Be selective with your results showing key findings only
- 4. Diagrams and drawings should be labeled and legible from a distance >1.5m
- 5. Graphs:
 - there should not be more than six line-graphs on a single plot.
 - coloured lines are the clearest way of distinguishing multi-line graphs.
 - graphs should be of the same size and scale (to enhance comparability).

Format

- Your poster should be <u>portrait alignment maximum size A0</u>. Do not exceed the sizes stated. Any landscape posters will not fit and will not be eligible to be displayed.
- 2. It is preferable to keep the background light to aid clarity and readability.
- **3.** The poster should read from left to right, and top to bottom.
- 4. A picture paints a thousand words.
- 5. Do not use more than 2 font types.
- 6. Avoid headings in UPPER CASE type as these are harder to read.
- 7. Text should be legible from > 1.5 m distance.
- 8. Carefully proof read to check for mistakes, legibility and inconsistencies.
- 9. Posters will also be accepted as e-Posters providing they meet the e-Poster guidelines.

Final checks

When you have finished, ask yourself / colleagues:

- 1. Is the poster well organised?
- 2. What is the overall message? Is your research explained in a clear, concise manner that a non-subject specialist could understand?
- 3. Can it be easily read from a distance of >1.5 m?
- 4. Is there too much or too little information?
- 5. Are the key findings highlighted?
- 6. Are the conclusions valid?
